2023 Legislative Scorecard Bills

(1) Carrying of Firearms HB1789 is clean-up for constitutional carry and clarifies identification needed and the immunity provided to the state, political subdivisions, officers and agents and employees relating to the issuance of licensure under the Oklahoma Self-Defense Act. This bill is now law. A "YES" vote is conservative. (2) OK cannot join ERIC HB2052 protects election integrity and data privacy by setting guardrails for Oklahoma's membership in multi-state voter list maintenance organizations, which help states in removing voters who have moved or are deceased. The bill requirements make Oklahoma ineligible for membership in the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) because of ERIC's repeated refusal to accept reforms requested by many member states. Ten states have discontinued membership. This bill is now law. A "YES" vote is conservative. loophole that was used to change parties in even numbered election years.
Those who wanted to vote one party in the June primary and a different party
in the August runoff were cancelling after the primary and re-registering. This
bill is now law. A "YES" vote is conservative.
(4) Health Info Exchange SB1369 (2022) mandated participation in a state health insurance exchange
(HIE) that would consolidate private patient health information in a government-
mandated central database maintained by third party entity MyHealth. This
data would then be available to all providers. Providers would be subject to a
start-up fee and ongoing monthly fees.
HJR1045 (2023) provided that providers who decline to participate would not
be subject to fines or penalties. The bill passed the House and Senate
committee, but was not heard on the Senate floor. SJR22 provided that the
Governor would make the decision on whether providers would be subject to
fines or penalties if they declined to participate. The bill passed both chambers
and was signed into law.
HB1688 (2023) Senate amendment provided that participation in the health
information exchange was voluntary instead of mandatory. Senate voted 33-
14 in favor of hearing the amendment, but the Senate author deferred the bill
without a vote. A conservative vote is a "YES" vote on HJR1045 OR a vote in
favor of hearing the HB1688 amendment. Leadership action to prevent
hearing of HJR1045 on Senate floor is considered a liberal vote.
(5) Gender Transition of SB613 prohibits gender transition procedures for minors, with exceptions for
Minors medically verifiable disorders. Such procedures include puberty blockers and
removal of sex organs. This bill is now law, but the AG is not enforcing it
pending ACLU action. A "YES" vote is conservative.

(6) Make buying sex a felony	HB2054 makes buying sex a felony and was requested by the Oklahoma City Police Vice Unit. The bill makes no changes in penalties for prostitutes, most of whom are trafficking victims. Texas passed a similar bill in 2021 and found it successful. This bill is now law. A "YES" vote is conservative.
(7) School Choice	HB1934 establishes a private education tax credit that is tiered based on a family income: \$5,000 to \$7,500 per student. It also allows a \$1,000 per student tax credit for qualified homeschooling expenses. This bill is now law. A "YES" vote is conservative.
(8) Teacher Raises	SB1119 provides \$385 million for teacher pay raises, which range from \$3,000 to \$6,000 based on years of experience. Another \$115 million is provided that could be used for support personnel raises if the school districts so choose. This bill is now law. A "YES" vote is conservative.
(9) Drivers Licenses for Illegals	SB669 / HB2114 (2023) and SB1591 (2022) would have allowed illegals to obtain driver's licenses and failed to include provisions that would be substantially effective for preventing illegals from registering to vote using driver's licenses as identification. SB1591 (2022) passed the full Senate and was not heard in the House. SB669 and HB2114 (2023) passed committee of their respective chambers, but were not heard by either full chamber. A "YES" vote on any of the three bills is liberal.
(10) Women's Bill of Rights	HB1449 / SB408 / SB202 (2023) define what a woman is, which can have significant impact on how statutes are interpreted, including whether biological men identifying as women can be sent to women's prisons OR can be in women's private spaces. HB1449 passed the House and was not heard in the Senate. SB408 passed the Senate and was not heard in the House. SB202 was revised in conference committee and the revisions was not heard by the full Senate or full House. A "YES" vote on any of the three bills is conservative.
(11) Eliminate State Grocery Tax	HB1955 would have eliminated the 4.5% state sales tax on groceries. This bill passed the House, but was not heard by the Senate. A "YES" vote is conservative.
(12) Curriculum Transparency	SB2077 required the State Department of Education to establish a website allowing parents to review and comment on curriculum and textbooks. Classroom instructional materials and lesson plans were not included. The bill failed House committee with 8 Rs voting yes, 17Rs and 7 Ds voting no. SB2078 required curriculum and textbooks to be subject to inspection by parents. The bill passed the House with 75 Rs voting yes and 15 Ds voting no and was not heard in the Senate. A "YES" vote on both bills is conservative. A "YES" vote on one bill and a "NO" vote on one bill is moderate.
